5. kindred

group of people related by blood or marriage

Good Master Mustardseed, I know your patience well: that same cowardly, giant-like ox-beef hath devoured many a gentleman of your house: I promise you your **kindred** had made my eyes water ere now.

6. rebuke

censure severely or angrily

O, why rebuke you him that loves you so?

7. troth

a solemn pledge of fidelity

Then fate o'er-rules, that, one man holding **troth**, A million fail, confounding oath on oath.

8. <u>confound</u>

mistake one thing for another

Then fate o'er-rules, that, one man holding troth, A million fail, **confounding** oath on oath.

9. derision

the act of treating with contempt

Why should you think that I should woo in scorn? Scorn and **derision** never come in tears

10. bequeath

leave or give, especially by will after one's death

And here, with all good will, with all my heart, In Hermia's love I yield you up my part;
And yours of Helena to me **bequeath**,
Whom I do love and will do till my death.

11. sojourn

spend a certain length of time; reside temporarily

If e'er I lov'd her, all that love is gone.

12. disparage

express a negative opinion of

Disparage not the faith thou dost not know

13. asunder

into parts or pieces

And will you rent our ancient love **asunder**,

To join with men in scorning your poor friend?

14. SCOrn

look down on with disdain

I am amazed at your passionate words.

I scorn you not: it seems that you scorn me.

15. hinder

be an obstacle to

Why, get you gone: who is't that **hinders** you?

16. Vixen

a malicious woman with a fierce temper

She was a **vixen** when she went to school, And though she be but little, she is fierce.



a noisy fight

Your hands than mine are quicker for a **fray**, My legs are longer though, to run away.

18. rail

criticize severely

Like to Lysander sometime frame thy tongue,
Then stir Demetrius up with bitter wrong;

19. harbinger

something indicating the approach of something or someone

meanness or nastiness

22. amiable

diffusing warmth and friendliness

Come, sit thee down upon this flowery bed,
While I thy **amiable** cheeks do coy,
And stick musk-roses in thy sleek smooth head,
And kiss thy fair large ears, my gentle joy.

23. upbraid

express criticism towards

For, meeting her of late behind the wood,

Seeking sweet favours from this hateful fool,

24. enamor

attract

My Oberon! what visions have I seen!

Methought I was **enamour'd** of an ass

25. amity

a state of friendship and cordiality

Now thou and I are new in **amity**,

26. rite

32. mar

33. paragon

a perfect embodiment of a concept

You must say 'paragon': a paramour is, God bless us, a thing of naught.

34. discourse

talk at length and formally about a topic

Masters, I am to **discourse** wonders: but ask me not what; for if I tell you, I am no true Athenian. I will tell you every thing, right as it fell out.

35. seething

in constant agitation

Lovers and madmen have such **seething** brains, Such shaping fantasies, that apprehend More than cool reason ever comprehends.



unrestrained merrymaking

What **revels** are in hand? Is there no play, To ease the anguish of a torturing hour?

Revels is used here in the sense of "festivities" or "entertainments."

37. discord

lack of agreement or harmony

Merry and tragical? Tedious and brief?

That is hot ice and wondrous strange snow.

How shall we find the concord of this discord?

38.<u>apt</u>

being of striking pertinence

But by ten words, my lord, it is too long,
Which makes it tedious. For in all the play
There is not one word apt, one player fitted.



work hard

Hard-handed men that work in Athens here,

40. amiss
